### Four UCHS basketball players selected to 7-AAA All-Region team

Senior Bailey Daniel and sophomores Kait McCarter, Pierson Allison, and Sawyer Drake were voted All-Region by the 7-AAA coaches.

Sophomores Brooke Dockrey and Andelin Hill, along with seniors Patrick Baggett, and Crawford Colwell were also recognized as Honorable Mention. Drake led the Panthers in

scoring at 13 points per game while Allison was second on the team at 12.1 per game.

Drake also led Union County at 6 rebounds a game, 2.9 steals per game, and one a game - good enough for sec-

blocked shot a game. His field goal percentage of .506 was also first on the team among players with at least 50 shot attempts and his 2.4 assists a game were second on the team.

Meanwhile, Allison led the team at 2.6 assists per game and was second with 2.4 steals and 49 made threes. His free throw percentage of .722 was first best on the team; he was third in rebounding at 4.5 a

Daniel led the Lady Panthers with 13 points a game, 2.8 steals, 65-percent from the line and 25 made threes. Her 1.9 assists were second while her 4.7 rebounds were third.

McCarter averaged 11.6

ond - while her 8.9 boards and 1.3 blocks were first. She shot a team-high .563 from the floor and was second on the team at

61-percent at the line. Crawford Colwell was fourth on the team at 8.7 points per game and tied for first at 6 rebounds a game.

Baggett's 52 treys was tops on the team while his .654 free throw percentage was second Hill was third on the

team in scoring at 8.2 per game while coming in second in rebounding at 7.5 a night and steals (1.4 per game).

Brooke Dockrey led the Lady Panthers in assists at 2.8 dimes a game while scoring 7.9 points per game - good enough for fourth.

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The Tigers hit 43-percent (16-for-37) from the floor and 33-percent (4-for-12) from downtown.

The largest disparity between the two teams came at the foul line. Dawson made 14 more free throws (23-of-30 for 77-percent) than Union County attempted (6-for-9). The duo of Crumley and Reed combined to sink 21-of-27 at the line with Crumley going 11-for-12.

The Tigers finished with six offensive boards and 28 total rebounds.

Colwell's 1,000

Crawford Colwell needed six points for 1,000 going into Friday's contest. He scored a deuce late in the first quarter then hit 1-of-2 at the line. After missing a three from the right wing earlier in the second frame, he was on the money from the left

Crawford Colwell has only attempted 27 threes this season - making five.

He becomes just the third 1,000 point scorer this decade, joining Rhett McCombs (2013) and Seth Merritt (2011). He becomes the just 12th men's basketball player and 22nd overall to reach the 1K milestone since

Michael Ross (2008) and Michael Adams (2003) are the only other players to score 1,000

Unlike the other four guys to reach 1K this century, Crawford Colwell accomplished it without relying heavily on the 3-point shot. The other four players were all deadly from long distance but Colwell did it the old-fashioned way.

The last true "post" player

to reach 1,000 points at Union County was Chris Adams back in 1994-95. Up next - The Panthers

will travel to East Hall on Tuesday to face North Hall. Tip-off is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. If Union County wins, they will advance to the region

semifinals on Friday in Dawsonville. The championship and consolation games will be held Saturday, also in Dawson If the Panthers advance, they would play No. 1 seed GAC

on Friday. The other bracket will feature No. 2 seed East Hall, 3-seed Dawson County, 6-seed Fannin County, and 7-seed Lumpkin County.

The Benton MacKaye Trail Association (BMTA) is seeking volunteers to help with trail maintenance for an upcom-

ing work trip. According to Barry Allen, Georgia work trip coordinator for the BMTA, a work trip is planned for Saturday, Feb. 10, on a section of the trail on the Sisson Property near Cherry Log. This month's Georgia work trip will focus on tree removal, water diversion work, and installation of vertical 6x6s with BMT diamond blazes to mark confusing areas of the trail. Allen stated at least one saw crew would be needed on the section to remove trees in a few locations.

Allen also stated, despite the possibility of a federal government shutdown over the weekend, the work trip will continue as planned since the work section is located on private lands. Typically, work trips are not allowed in the National Forest during government shut-

All work trip participants are asked to wear sturdy shoes or boots, pants and long sleeve

shirts, work gloves and, for

cold-weather trips, multiple thin layers that can be easily shed one at a time. Also, a daypack for storing food, water or other items is always a good idea for work trips. Food and water are not supplied by the BMTA on work trips; however, tools are provided by the Association. The BMTA recommends workers to bring at least two liters of

water for the trip. Those interested can meet either at The Village Restaurant in Blue Ridge for breakfast at 8 a.m. or at the Craddock Center

parking area at 9 a.m.

The Benton MacKaye Trail spans three states - Georgia, Tennessee and North Carolina – and nearly 300 miles from Springer Mountain, GA, to Davenport Gap in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and is enjoyed by thousands of hikers and outdoor enthusiasts each For anyone with ques-
