that they lost all of their stuff in those buildings, but if it had caught their house on fire, it really would have been devastating.

The Kimsey Street fire is the third structure fire in Union County in the last two weeks, which Dyer said was both usual and unusual.

"This is our housefire season, when the colder temperatures move in, January, February, March," said Dyer. "But this is sort of unusual to

have them so close together, so like 68 volunteers, and we it is kind of strange, but we are really proud of the response."

More than a dozen volunteer firefighters showed up to fight the blaze, which is a terrific turnout, considering that the fire took place in the middle of a Friday afternoon.

'We could always use more volunteers, and any area needs it," said Dyer. "We've done a really hard recruitment program in the last two years, and it's paying off, because we're getting this response.
