

Ice cold shooting dooms Union; Dawson ends Lady Panthers' season

Norcross - The Lady Panthers saw their season come to an end last week at the hands of the Dawson County Lady Tigers during the opening round of the Region 7-AAA tournament at Greater Atlanta Christian.

Just four days removed from an upset victory over the Lady Tigers in Dawsonville, Union County stumbled in the rubber match after holding an 11-10 advantage after one quarter of action.

Dawson went on to out-score the Lady Panthers 40-12 over the final three quarters as Union's All-Region Team selection, junior Bailey Daniel scored 13 of her team's 23 points in the 50-23 defeat.

Senior Ashley Fair recorded 5 points, 8 rebounds, 3 steals, and 2 blocks to finish her high school career. Later in the week she was selected as Honorable Mention in Region 7-AAA.

The Lady Panthers' other Honorable Mention selection, freshman Kait McCarter added 2 points and 7 boards.

Falling one point shy of two-dozen, the Lady Panthers were held to their lowest scoring total since 2011 and the lowest of Head Coach David Tucker's tenure at Union County High School. For the game, Union shot a season-low 15 percent from the floor (7-for-46) while hitting 17-percent (4-for-24) from 3-point range and turning it over 21 times.

Also, for the first time under Tucker, Union did not reach the state playoffs - ending a streak of six-consecutive seasons in the field of 32. The girls loss on Tuesday, combined with the boys loss on Wednesday, marked the first time since 2010 that both Union County basketball teams failed to reach the state tournament.

Despite the abysmal shooting performance, Union County led 11-10 after the first quarter thanks to 8 points

on two treys from Daniel. Fair chipped in a basket and freshman Brooke Dockrey hit 1-for-2 at the line with 2.8 seconds remaining in the period to give her team the one-point advantage.

However, the hoop was unkind to the Lady Panthers during the second quarter as Dawson opened with 12-unanswered points. Union's first points of the period didn't come until under a minute to play when McCarter scored on a

put-back to trim the Lady Tiger advantage to nine at 22-13.

Following a steal-and-score by Dawson, Daniel sank a trey with 22 seconds left but the Lady Tigers responded with the final bucket of the half to take a 26-16 lead into the intermission.

Things went from bad-to-worse in the third as Union went the entire quarter without a single basket. The only points came on a pair of Daniel free throws and Dawson extended

its lead to 22 thanks to a 14-2 third frame.

Trailing 40-18 to begin the fourth, Fair connected from downtown to pull Union within 19 but the next five points belonged to the Lady Tigers as they opened up a 45-21 advantage at the 5:18 mark.

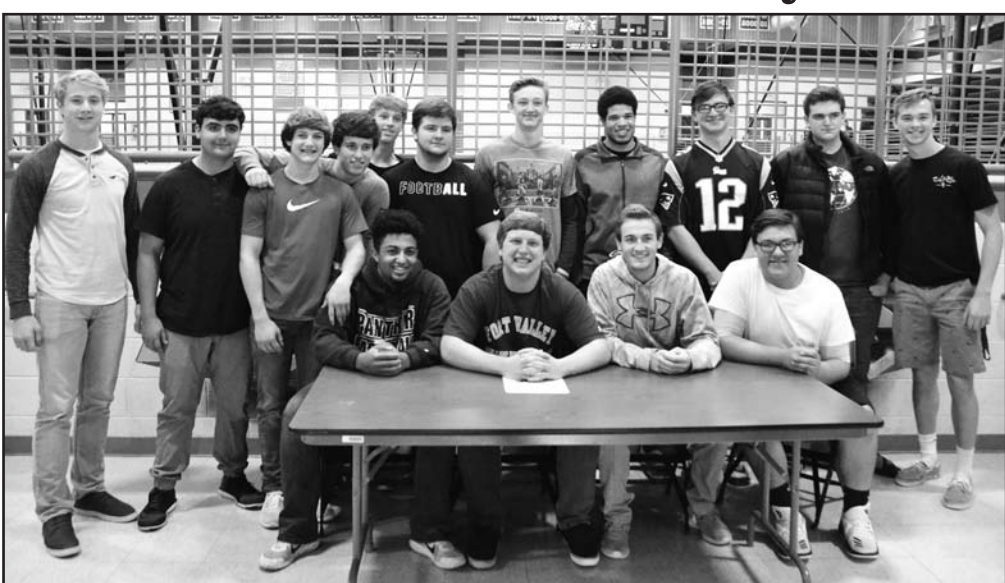
Andelin Hill scored the Lady Panthers' final bucket of the season with a 15-footer at the 4:56 mark to make it a 45-23 game before Dawson closed with another 5-0 spurt.



Following its one-sided win over Union, Dawson continued its stellar play with a second round upset of North Hall to reach the 7-AAA finals for the fifth consecutive season.

Unfortunately for the Lady Tigers, they ran into GAC during the finals where they managed to hang around for a half until the Lady Spartans' talent and depth proved too much down the stretch and they pulled away for the Region title.

Brown selects Fort Valley State

Two days after National Signing Day, the Union County Panthers' Blaine Brown announced that he would be attending Fort Valley State University in the fall.

According to Brown, FVSU first took interest after he turned to an online recruiting service following his junior season at UCHS.

And after a senior season that saw him earn First Team All Region honors, his online account, which included a highlight reel, began to receive a quite number of hits, and most of them were coming from one school.

"Fort Valley viewed (my account) 40-something times over the last month-and-a-half," he said. "So I went down there for a visit, I enjoyed it and they really seemed interested so I signed."

Despite playing tackle for the majority of his high school career, Fort Valley is considering moving Brown to center. And although he's never played center, the fact that FVSU runs a spread offense similar to Union County could ease the transition.

"They are looking at me as a tackle or center but they are a spread offense and

that's a huge help," he said.

Brown, who plans on majoring in agricultural economics, chose FVSU over Catawba, Brevard, and Shorter University.

"I just want to thank my mom, dad, and all of the support from my family and friends," Brown added.

Founded in 1895, FVSU is a historically black college located in Fort Valley, Ga, approximately 25 miles southwest of Macon. Both the campus and city of Fort Valley reside in Peach County.

The Wildcats football team are the reigning Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) champs and are members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II in both men's and women's athletic programs.

The schools colors are royal blue and gold and currently feature an undergraduate enrollment of 2,266 students.

Fort Valley State has one alum in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Rayfield Wright, an offensive tackle for the Dallas Cowboys from 1967-79.

He was a six-time Pro Bowler, three-time All Pro, and a two-time Super Bowl winner.

Other NFL alumni include Pittsburgh All Pro

linebacker Greg Lloyd (1988-98), Raiders free safety Eddie Anderson (1986-97), cornerback Nick Harper who split time between the Colts and Titans from 2001-09, Dallas' 4th round draft pick, defensive end Peppi Zellner (1999-04), who finished his career with Washington and Arizona during each of his final two seasons.

FVSU's only first round pick came in 1995 when Carolina took Tyrone Pool 22nd overall. He went on to win two Super Bowls with the Patriots during a 14-year career at cornerback that saw him make stops in Indianapolis, Oakland, and Tennessee.

The 2017 football season opens at the University of West Georgia on Aug. 23 at 7 p.m..

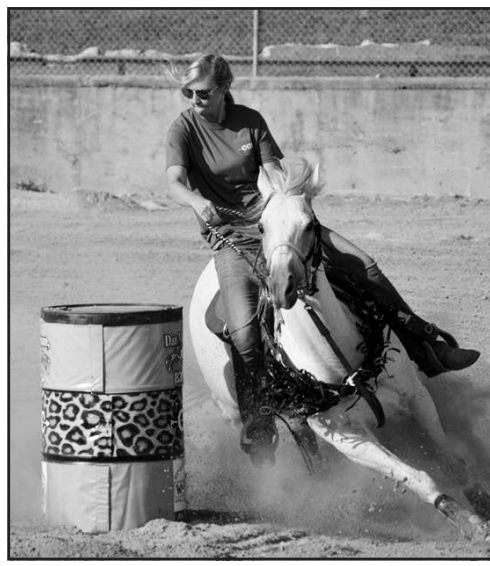
in 2016.
