He started with the post office on Jan. 1, 1979, as a rural carrier associate, or substitute driver, and he became a regular rural carrier on May 7, 1986, when he took over Route 5.

"For years, there were four routes, and they just had made Route 5 when I went to work as a sub," said Lance. "Now, we've got 18 routes. A long time ago, there were four people who delivered the mail to the whole county. But we've got so many people now and so many houses, it takes 18 (drivers)."

Next year, Lance will celebrate his 40th anniversary working for the post office, and he said he's seen a lot in that time.

"I knew people when they were pretty young, and they've gotten married and had kids. Now, I'm delivering mail to their kids," said Lance. "It's just like a family out there."

Added Lance: "I'd just like to thank all the patrons over the years that I've been able to serve. We've been real close, and I really love them. They've been nice to me, and I've tried to do a good job for them."
