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Union County schools started last week, first day a success

City of Blairsville millage rate stays at 2 mills

For yet another year running, the Blairsville City Council voted to keep the millage rate at 2 mills, which will this year bring in \$124,649 in property taxes from city residents.

According to the tax digest and five-year history, the city will be bringing in about \$1,803 more than last year with the same millage rate, thanks to an increase in property values.

NGTC hosts Active Shooter training event

The Department of Homeland Security, Georgia Emergency Management Agency (GEMA) and the Blairsville campus of North Georgia Technical College (NGTC) hosted an Active Shooter training exercise for law enforcement officers from Union County Sheriff's Office, the Blairsville Police and other local first responders.

The Friday, Aug. 5, exercise simulated a school shooting, forcing law enforcement to respond and confront the gunman, and to secure the scene for EMT's to enter and treat the wounded.

Faculty and staff of NGTC posed as students, teachers, and staff members with some portraying shooting victims, both deceased and injured.

Kevin Dyer of the Georgia Department of Natural Resources played the role of the gunman, whose rampage began by mortally wounding a financial aid officer with a gunshot to the head, he

then murdered another faculty member who was on the phone with 911 emergency services to report shots being fired.

He began traveling throughout the building looking for more victims while those posing as students or faculty had the option to run or hide until the coast was clear.

"Some of the faculty

members here have been trained to 'run, hide, fight' during an active shooter situation," NGTC Officer Jeff Edge said. "At the first opportunity, you want to try and get away.

"If you can't run or get away, hide or barricade yourself in a room, a closet, or a bathroom. Then you need to start making

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County audit reports revenues up in 2015

In a special called meeting on Thursday, Aug. 4, accountant Clay Pilgrim of Rushton & Clay Pilgrim presented the audit report for the county's fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2015.

Financial audits are mandated by state law, and must be turned in to the state no later than June 30 each year. The auditing process begins in April, and once completed and turned into the state, the audit is presented to the public.

"This would have normally been presented at the last county meeting on July 21, but the firm was unable to attend that meeting, so we set

up this special meeting for the purpose of presentation of the audit," said Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris.

According to details of the audit, which can be obtained through the commissioner's office, General Fund revenues in 2015 increased by \$1.64 million when compared to Fiscal Year 2014.

This increase is due mainly to a \$982,467 increase in property tax intake – a key indicator of continued economic growth within the county during 2015.

Collection of other taxes increased as well, further attesting to the overall expansion in Union County's tax base: motor vehicle taxes, up \$130,688; local option sales taxes, up \$87,029; insurance

premium taxes, up \$71,888.

YOUNG HARRIS – Towns and Union County Extension Agent Melissa Mattee mulled over matters of lawn and flora care with the Mountain Movers and Shakers during their weekly meeting on Friday, Aug. 5, at Mary's Southern Grill.

This is not the conservative educational group's first encounter with the self-proclaimed "bug lady" – Mattee spoke with the Movers and Shakers for the first time back in March, when she introduced herself to the community and instantly became a hit among the members.

Mattee addressed the group on topics of current relevance at the extension office – proper lawn care, black knot – fungus, fire blight and

mummy berry.

"It's really important, if you have any grass at all, to have upkeep to prevent erosion and maintain greenery around your home," said Mattee. "September is a really important month for our grasses, whether you're establishing a lawn or just maintaining it."

According to Mattee, grass in the North Georgia Mountains is typically Fescue, which allows for survival during the cold weather months. September is the prime time to seed for a Fescue lawn due to its bump in growth after the heat and humidity of summer has lessened.

Fescue grasses have a three season growing period – fall, winter and spring. While most people assume that grass becomes dormant during the winter months, Fescue grass actually continues to grow during this time, gathering
