

Dockrey injures knee in 17-7 scrimmage loss to Chestatee

Union County left Friday night's 17-7 scrimmage loss to Chestatee with more questions than answers following struggles on both sides of the ball and a potentially serious injury at the quarterback position.

Junior quarterback Cade Dockrey left the game with a left knee injury during the second quarter after attempting to cut inside on a first-down scamper near midfield. As of Monday morning, no further info was available regarding his status going forward.

"Right now, we have a plan with [Dockrey at QB] and a plan without him," Union County head coach Michael Perry said Sunday afternoon. "Regardless, even if it's not serious, he's probably going to be out for a while. But when he was in [the game Friday], he played really well."

Despite the final tally, Friday's preseason contest showed promise in the early going when Union put 7 points on the board during the game's opening drive.

Starting from the 30, Dockrey hit junior Tyler Parker for 6 yards, then senior running back Connor Schuknecht bounced outside for 62 yards. Two plays later, Dockrey blasted his way in from the 1-yard line, and sophomore Grant Smith converted the PAT.

That was all the scoring Union County could muster as Chestatee's power-running game took control, while the Panthers' offense couldn't regain their footing.

The War Eagles answered via an 18-play scoring drive that covered 70 yards, scoring on a 36-yard completion -- the only pass attempt of the series.

"Right now, outside linebacker and defensive line looks like a huge weakness," Perry said. "Getting Ethan [Lester] back will be a big boost to our defense. We have another kid, Micah Wallace, who will

According to Perry, Union County's defensive standouts were Kaden Combs, Kevin Kilpatrick and Darin Patterson.

"I can't say enough about Kaden Combs and his effort. He never came off the field. I don't know how many tackles for a loss he had on defense and he was pancaking people on offense. It's a pleasure to coach a kid like that.

'Another one is Kevin Kilpatrick. He's never played for us before but he did his job and put people on the ground. I'm really proud of him.

"I'm also very proud of on third down.

"He's another kid that hasn't efffort guy and does everything he can for us."

All tied up at 7-7, a penalty derailed Union's next drive after Dockrey and Parker hooked up again, then Dockrey moved the chains with his legs. Chestatee took over at the 25 following a punt and advanced inside the Union 10 on 11 plays. However, a costly pen-

alty against the offense limited the War Eagles to a 27-yard field goal.

Union failed to answer after a holding flag dropped Union into 1st and 17, and Dockrey left the game after moving the chains with his legs


Sophomore Chetley Cox replaced the injured starter behind center, but the drive stalled when Chestatee dropped Cox on a third-down sack.

After the Panthers' defense forced its first stop of the night, the offense went threeand-out in the final minute of the half.

Chestatee opened the third period with a 20-play, 70-yard scoring drive for a 17-7 advantage.

Cox and the offense moved the chains when the quarterback scrambled for 12 on third and 11, but the drive eventually stalled near midfield.

The Union defense stood its ground but an interception derailed the Panthers' ensuing offensive possession.

The JV squads took over in the fourth and freshman Kamden Kendrick replaced Cox. Unfortunately, a tipped pass led to another Panthers interception two weeks to regroup before on Kendrick's second attempt, but Chestatee gave it right back when Union pounced on a fumble deep in its own territory.

From there, Kendrick settled in and completed four straight passes on the next drive and had Union County inside the War Eagles' 10 before the drive stalled.

"We're going to have to get creative at the quarterback position," Perry said. "We're going to look at the other quarerbacks we have, and probably give some other guys a look. "And if it ends up a

Volleyball: Union County opens 2024 with 3-1 loss to Pickens

Union County dropped a tightly-contested 3-1 home matchup to Pickens in the 2024 season opener on Thursday, Aug. 8, falling 25-27, 25-27 and 25-22 during the first, third and fourth sets.

Union secured the second set 25-17.

Set One: Pickens 27, Union 25 - The Panthers erased a 20-16 margin, eventually seizing a 25-24 advantage until Pickens rattled off three straight to close the set.


Juniors Reese Jones and Mady Adams spotted Union County an early 4-2 edge until the Dragons raced ahead 12-7 and maintained the lead until the home stretch.

Set Two: Union 25, Pickens 17 - The Panthers never trailed in the second set after Jones helped spot her team a quick 3-1 lead. Adams, along with seniors Katelyn Brown and Lily Brookshire kept Union out front by scores of 9-5, 11-6 and 13-7. Senior Mallory Rouse and sophomore Payton Murphy got in on the scoring to mount a 16-8 advantage before Pickens scored the next three.

Kills from Jones and Adams halted the Dragons' momentum, then a Charlei Robinson ace made it 20-11.

Later, with Union up 23-17, Brown and Brookshire closed the set with consecutive kills

Set Three: Pickens 27, Union 25 - Knotted at 6-6 in the early going, Pickens scored the next five before a pair of Brown aces had Union within

Softball: Dyer's heroics lift Union County past Dawson County Lady Panthers blanked at White, fall to Prince Avenue and Alcovy

The Lady Panthers (3-4) dropped three of four last week, winning their lone home contest 8-5 over Dawson County on Thursday, Aug. 8.

Earlier in the week, Union County suffered a 9-0 loss at White County before taking a pair of losses on Saturday to Alcovy and Prince Avenue Christian.

Union resumed action on Monday, Aug. 12 vs. White County and will open region play at Rockmart on Thursday, Aug. 15. The Lady Panthers will travel to Dahlonega on Saturday to face Lumpkin County and Lanier.

Lady Panthers 8, Daw-Sloane Dver 3-run homer in the bottom of the sixth inning made the difference in Union County's third win of 2024.





With two down and two aboard in the sixth, Dyer belted the first pitch of the at-bat over the centerfield fence, spotting Union County an 8-5 advantage

Mikala Souther opened the Union sixth with a single to center, then advanced to second on Delaney Moses' sacrifice bunt. A strikeout brought Izzy Anthros to the plate, and the sophomore reached on an error, putting runners at the corners for Dyer.

Anthros locked down the 118-pitch complete-game victory in the seventh, facing four batters and working around a two-out single. The sophomore finished the day with 8 strikeouts, allowing 5 hits and 2 earned runs over 7 innings.

Dyer led the way at the dish, going 3 for 4 with 3 RBIs and 3 runs. Moses homered during a 1-for-2 day; senior Jordane Mullanack went 2 for 4.

Dawson jumped out front in the first courtesy of an unearned run, but Union responded with two in the bottom half via an Anthros double, a Dyer single and a Lady Tigers' error. Moses' solo homer to

left grew the lead to 3-1 in the second, but Dawson answered with one in the third.

The Lady Panthers built a 5-2 lead in their half of the frame, capitalizing on four singles and a sacrifice fly.

The score remained locked at 5-2 until the fifth when Dawson used a walk, a hit by pitch, a single and a double to even the game at 5-5. Union County wasted a leadoff single in the bottom half before Dyer's big blast in the sixth put Dawson away.

Lily Helton finished 1 for 3, Addison Whitener went 1 for 2 and drove in a run; Reese Kelley added a sacrifice fly and Stella Collins scored once.

Lady Panthers 0, White County 9 (5 inns) - The Lady Warriors jumped out front 4-0

after two in Cleveland, then put up a 4-spot in the third and tacked on a run in the fourth.

Singles by Anthros and Mullanack and a Souther walk was all the offense Union County could muster. Jaslyn Roberts and Anthros reached on errors.

Whitener went 3 innings, giving up 8 hits, 5 earned and striking out one. Anthros allowed a solo homer during an inning in relief.

Lady Panthers 5, Alcovy 10 - Union County couldn't dig its way out of a 5-0 deficit during the first of two losses at Prince Avenue Christian on Saturday.

Dyer doubled and stole a base during a 2-for-4 day with an RBI. Mullanack doubled and knocked in two runs; Anthros went 1 for 2 with a triple, a walk and 2 RBIs.

Union County trailed 5-0 heading to the bottom of the fourth but free passes to Kelley and Souther allowed Anthros to clear the bases with her two-out triple.

Alcovy bumped its lead to 8-2 in the fifth before adding two more runs in the sixth.

With their team trailing 10-2 and two down in the Union half of the sixth, Zady Ludlum singled, then Peyton Grisham and Roberts worked a base on balls

Dyer scored Ludlum via an infield single and Mullanack's double brought home two more.

Anthros went 3 1/3, surrendering 7 hits, 5 earned, 2 walks and striking out five. Whitener gave up 3 hits and 2 earned over 2 1/3 innings; Roberts allowed 3 hits and 3 earned during 1 1/3.

Souther went 1 for 3

Grisham, Moses and Roberts added one run each.

Lady Panthers 3, Prince Avenue 11 (5 inns) -Union County scored three in the fifth after falling behind 9-0 after four.

Mullanack homered during a 2 for 3 day and Dyer went 1 for 3 with a double and an RBI. Whitener also doubled during a 1 for 3 performance.

Anthros and Ludlum added base hits; Roberts scored a run.

Union's fifth began when
