48th Annual Blairsville Sorghum Festival begins this weekend



Dr. Lodge is up against the Rev. Mike Stone of Emmanuel Baptist Church in Blackshear, Georgia, who also is a nominee for president of the Georgia Baptist Convention.

This is the 196th Annual Meeting of the Georgia Baptist Convention. It will be held Sunday, Nov. 12, through Tuesday, Nov. 14, at the North Metro First Baptist Church in Lawrenceville. Election of officers is scheduled for Nov. 14.

Rev. Stone has been at Emmanuel since 1996 and has served as senior pastor of the congregation since 2002.

Dr. Lodge came to First Baptist Church Blairsville on July 17, 2005, coming from a nine-year ministry in Nashville, Tennessee. He also has led Flat Creek Baptist Church in Gainesville, Georgia.

But graduating from the North Enotah Drug Court accountability program doesn't mean that the war on addiction has been won. On the contrary, graduates of the program understand better than anyone that graduation is only the first major step toward a lifelong

traffic stops, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason said.


First, Milton Ellsworth Wrenn, 57, of Moultrie, was pulled over Oct. 5 by Union County Sheriff's Deputy Alan

Cook and Jonathan Love. Cook and Love are running to fill the remaining two years of former Blairsville City Councilmember Martha Cone's term on the council.

Cone passed away in May following a brief illness.

Election Day voting will take place on Nov. 7 at Blairsville City Hall, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Eligible voters must

present one of the following pieces of identification at time of voting: a Georgia Driver's License; a valid Georgia Voter ID Card; a valid U.S. Passport; a valid Government Issued Employee ID Card with photo; or a valid U.S. Military ID Card with photo.
