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## XC: Hunter, Union girls third at State Championships

Hillman takes seventh, leads Union guys to sixth place finish

Carrollton - Junior Lola Hunter placed third to lead the Union County ladies to a bronze medal performance - their highest team finish in program history during Saturday's Class AA State Championships at Carrollton High School.

Earlier in the day, sophomore Oliver Hillman turned in a seventh-place finish in the guys' race as Union County took home sixth.

Unfortunately, Hunter took a spill during the final mile of the girls' race when a group of Pike County boys' runners, who had already raced, cut across the course and contacted Union's leader, costing her at least 15-20 seconds and preventing her from challenging

"She was knocked down onto all fours and she was spiked on the back of the leg," Union County Cross Country coach Paige Dyer said. "It didn't cost her a state championship, but the girl in second finished 30 seconds ahead of her, so it possibly cost her second place. 'She was at full speed

and never saw them coming. It was like a blindside block in football. I've been to that state meet probably 12 times and I've never seen anything like that happen before. Never."

Hunter finished at 20 minutes, 54 seconds, a halfminute back of second-place Leah Nyce of Savannah Arts Academy (20:24) and 73 seconds behind the winner, Olivia DiQuattro of Columbus

Junior Avery Hussion crossed the line in 41st at 26:08; freshman Macy Payne was 46th with a time of 26:13; senior Lydia Wagner placed 47th at 26:14; junior Averie Tanner was 49th at 26:19.

Freshman Kate Barrett came in 62nd with a time of 27:24 and senior Katie Payne was 72nd at 28:02.

#### Hogsed, Payne lead Union in 77-64 scrimmage win over Gilmer

Union County basketball begins its 2024-25 season at Towns County on Thursday, Nov. 14, following last week's scrimmage win over Gilmer.

Initially scheduled for Nov. 15, the contest at Towns County was rescheduled due to Union County football's playoff game at Sumter County.

Under sixth-year coach Corey Garrett, the Union County men open at No. 9 in Class AA despite returning only two full-time starters, seniors Houston Henry and Hayden Hughes, from last year's 21-win region runner-up squad. As of August, the Panthers expected to bring back its entire seven-man rotation from 2023-24, but injuries and transfers have sliced into the depth chart.

Headlining the departures is 1,000-point scorer Jude Ellis, who transferred to Gainesville's Lakeview Academy before the start of the school year. Ellis was second on the team at just under 14 points a game in 2023-24.

Meanwhile, junior Cade Dockrey suffered a torn ACL during football and will miss the 2024-25 season. Dockrey was among the Panthers' top four in nearly every statistical category during his first season

Finally, 6-foot-4, 245-pound sophomore Jaxon Totherow will spend the com-

With the loss of Dockrey and Ellis in the backcourt, expect senior Maddox Young and sophomore Ethan Hogsed to slide into those spots. Young, a starter during Union's Sweet 16 run in 2022-23, missed the first half of his junior year and returned in a limited role off the bench. As soon as Young returns from football, he should be back to being a key component of the Panthers' lineup.

Hogsed, a talented sophomore, appeared in only nine varsity games as a freshman but led the JV team in scoring. And that appears to be carrying over this season. Hogsed scored 16 points during Union's scrimmage to share leadingscorer honors with another underclassman: Junior guard Holden Payne.

Payne appeared in six games a year ago but will be one of Garrett's first options off with 92 as a sophomore, he the bench in a deep backcourt.

Sophomore sharpshooter Hayden Price should see more playing time this winter while his 6-foot-5 frame is a bonus, especially for an undersized squad. Sophomore Ryland Chambers is another 3-point threat who has played his way into a larger role this season.

### Lady Panthers eye Region title, playoff run in year-two under Nelson

The Union County Lady Panthers and second-year coach Thomas Nelson have finishing 17-12 in 2023-24, advancing to the Region 8-AA title game and the Class AA Sweet 16.

"Our expectations are always high," Nelson said. "This year looks a lot different with six seniors, who have been here for a while and have game experience. That makes it a lot easier for us."

Entering Thursday's season opener at Towns County, Union brings back a solid senior nucleus this winter in All-Region selections Kateltn Brown and Ariel McCarter, along with 6-foot-1 post Hope

Unfortunately, the Lady Panthers bid farewell to graduated seniors Kamryn Mull, Lara Turner and Morgan Warren along with Paula Robertson, who transferred to Gilmer over the summer.

Turner, a four-year starter was slowed by injuries during her senior season, paving the way for a breakout year from Taylor. Mull, who started two years at point guard, shot ing starters, McCarter topped



But Robinson's transfer might be the biggest blow after she ended 2023-24 second on the team in scoring (11 ppg) and assists (2.1 apg).

As for Union's return-

Taylor, meanwhile, came on strong down the stretch for Union County, scoring 15 points and pulling down 7 boards during her team's near-upset at a top-five Murray County during the Sweet 16. She ended her junior year at 6 points and 5 rebounds a night.

Senior Sloane Dyer is expected to slide into the starting lineup after providing a spark off the bench the last two seasons. Last December, she came off the bench to knock down three 3-pointers and score 11 points in a win at Murphy, North Carolina. 'It'll be big having

Sloane," Coach Nelson said. "She's just getting back from a successful softball season and we expect big things from her

During her freshman season, she showed flashes of potential with her ball handling and court vision, but the new point guard emerged during the summer camps, proving she's a more than capable scorer as well.

"She has really stepped forward," Coach Nelson said. "She's done a lot this summer to get better. She's another one our team that is leading us in the right direction."

Union did suffer a blow during the scrimmage loss to Gilmer when senior Hensley Adams sustained a serious knee injury that ended her final year prematurely.

'That really hurts us," Coach Nelson said. "She was one our of captains and one of our leaders. She had really stepped up and we were expecting a big year out of her. She was here everyday during the offseason and it's really sad when a kid that works that

hard has that type of injury." Others expected to take on a larger role in 2024-25 are senior Aubrie Akins and junior

Ragan McCarter and Nomi Nelson.

In addition, forwards Tatum Fisher (junior) and McKenna Hood (sophomore) could make contributions after moving up from junior varsity.

With the injury to Hensley Adams, Coach Nelson believes that freshmen Samantha Combs and Livy Haney could be thrust into some varsity minutes to fill the void.

"Those two have shined on the JV team, they're good ball handlers, and with Hensley going down, they could step up and take some of those minutes," he said. During the 59-45 scrim-

mage loss to Gilmer, Union County jumped out front 10-0 but Gilmer responded with a 17-2 run and never trailed the rest of the night. Ariel McCarter and

Union County opens Thursday at Towns County at 5:30 p.m. They visit Habersham Central at 6 p.m. on Saturday, where the Lady Panthers will play after the 4:30 p.m. boys game. 'We're looking to cut
