On Dec. 15, the Panthers will visit Robbinsville, NC before traveling to Banks County on Dec. 18 and East Hall on


Union County returns to the Tarheel State for the Swain County Duals on Dec. 22 before wrapping up the month at Gilmer on Dec. 29.

She was victorious in the 100-yard backstroke at the Tennessee Invitational in Knoxville with a time of 52.27. She also set a personal record with a 22.12 in the 50-yard freestyle. Marsh was previously the swim coach at Auburn where he won 12 national championships. His youngest daughter, Maddie, currently swims at Auburn. His son Aaron is at Queens University in Charlotte, NC as track and field distance runner.
