UCSO takes more drugs off the street

Gary Lee Hogsed, 66, Betty Eugenia Hogsed, 61, and Betty's son William Wesley Gibson, 44, all of Union County, were arrested for the manufacture of marijuana on Wednesday, May 18, according to the Union County Sheriff's Office.

Prior to the arrests, the Union County Sheriff's Office had received information that guns were possibly being fired at the residence of the Hogseds and Gibson, according to the sheriff's office.

"We assisted the Georgia Department of Community Supervision on a field check, which resulted in the findings of two rifles and four marijuana plants," said UCSO Capt. Chad Deyton with the Narcotics Division.

All three individuals were arrested on charges of manufacturing marijuana, according to the sheriff's office.

Gary Hogsed and Gibson were charged with two counts each of possession of a firearm by a felon, according to Capt. Deyton, and Gary Hogsed was also charged with violating parole, while Gibson was charged with violating probation.

"If you're going to do this, you're not going to do it in our community," said Union County Sheriff Mack Mason. "We're going to do what it takes to keep the community safe."
