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Steppe witnesses his last UCHS graduating class as superintendent

Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Steppe and the Union County High School Class of 2016 have one major thing in common – they are both leaving.

Steppe will retire at the end of June after five years at the helm of Union County Schools, and he looked on proudly as graduates displayed their Panther Pride during the Commencement Exercises in Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium on Friday, May 27.

The seniors took to the field in pairs of two, dressed in the traditional garb of graduation – white caps and gowns for the young women and purple for the young men.

As they reached the staging area of the ceremony at the middle of the field, many of the senior duos celebrated in front of the crowd of family and friends by offering special salutes to graduation via pre-determined congratulatory “handshakes” between walking partners.

One thing that makes UCHS graduation ceremonies so special is that they are for the most part student-run events, and the Class of 2016 followed suit, with the high school Chamber Choir singing the national anthem just prior to senior Mackenzie DiNatale’s welcoming of gathered guests, which included special recognition of one person who could not attend.

Memorial Day is a federal holiday set aside for the observance and remembrance of the ultimate sacrifices made by the hundreds of thousands of brave souls that perished in service to their country as members of the U.S. Armed Forces.

Union County observes Memorial Day with a parade and a ceremony in honor of the nation's war dead, always the Saturday before the holiday.

The parade gives area residents the opportunity to get out and remember those who have died, and dozens of area businesses and civic groups take part in the parade each year to show their community pride.

New to the Saturday, May 28, parade route was the utilization of the recently completed Bob Head Street, which shaved some major walking and drive time off the original route for those participating in the parade.

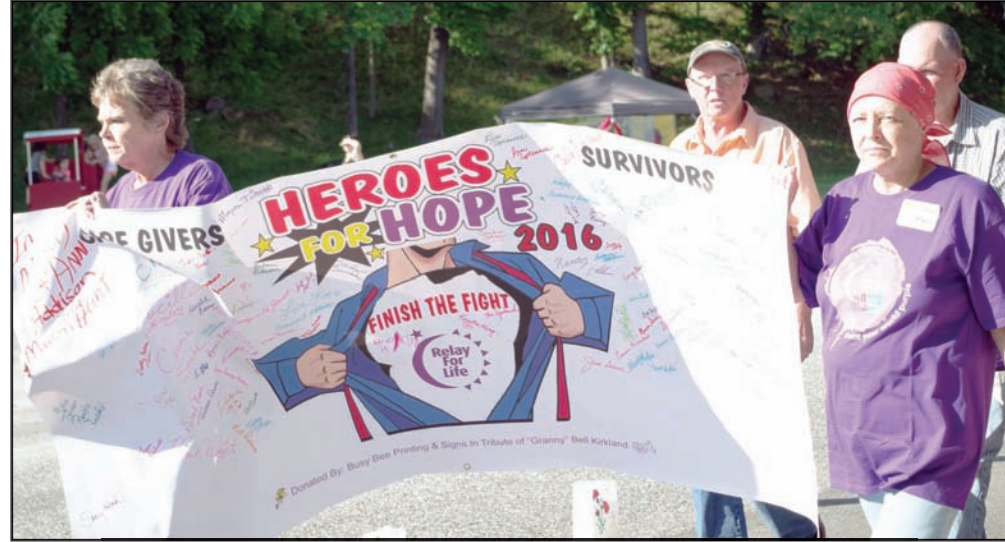
