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Lady Panthers starting to peak in time for postseason

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Union County (15-10, 8-3) will be riding a four-game winning streak entering the final week of the regular season.

Losers of seven of their last nine games, Union roared back with an undefeated week, sparked by a pair of non-Region wins over East Hall and Lumpkin, then capped off in front of the home crowd by sweeping a double header from Washington-Wilkes on Senior Night.

The Lady Panthers traveled to Lumpkin on Monday and have games at Rabun County and at North Murray slated for this week. Union was victorious in the first meeting against each of the three teams and will be looking for the season sweep.

Union has already locked themselves into the third seed in 8-AA and will host Washington-Wilkes in the opening round of the Region Tournament. The matchup will be a best 2-of-3 series beginning on Tuesday, Oct. 1st. If necessary, the third game would be played on Oct. 2nd. If the Lady Panthers take the series, they would secure their fifth consecutive State Playoff berth.

Union County 3 East Hall 1

The Lady Panthers paid a visit to Valhalla last Monday with the direction of their season at stake.

And despite being a non-Region game, Union left with a much needed confidence boost, thanks to a 3-1 victory over the East Hall Lady Vikings.

Freshman Laken Chambers' drove in all three runs on three hits that included a two-run homer (2). She also picked up the win, working a complete game, scattering six hits and striking out seven.

The Lady Vikings, however, struck first in the second inning thanks to a lead off double and a two-out single.

It would remain a 1-0 game until Union got two in the fourth. Sophomore Johnah Langston reached on an error, setting the stage for Chambers. The Lady Panther pitcher sent a high fly over the centerfield fence for a two-run blast.

Union added an insurance run in the fifth when junior Halle King reached on a leadoff walk. Junior Courtney Busbee got aboard on an infield single, and Langston

loaded the bases when the East Hall shortstop couldn't handle a grounder. With the bags packed, Chambers came through again with a base hit to center, scoring King.

You could say Union was simply returning the favor for a loss to East Hall earlier this month at the Veterans' Tournament in Oconee County. But to Union County Head Coach Jessica Stewart, this game was about regrouping her troops and getting back to playing softball the right way – the Union County way.

The earlier loss to the Lady Vikings came in the midst of one of Union's worst losing spells under Coach Stewart's command. However, following a win over White County and an extra inning loss at Jefferson, Coach Stewart had a feeling that her Lady Panthers were about to find their groove with the post season right around the corner.

"These girls are capable of big things," Coach Stewart said last week after three tough Region losses. "We just need all aspects clicking at the same time. We've got to hit and can't make errors. I've told the girls this is the most important time of the year and if we get hot

now we will do well in the post season."

Union County 8 Lumpkin County 4

The positive mojo of the young softballers continued to build as they went to Lumpkin County and feasted on the Lady Indians' pitching staff to the tune of 8 runs on 12 hits.

Five Union hits went for extra bases including a two-run blast (3) of the bat of freshman Laken Chambers, staking Union to a 7-1 lead in the fifth inning.

"We are playing much better softball all the way around," Coach Stewart said. "We started hitting and both (Crystal) Busbee and Chambers are giving us an opportunity to win. I felt like the Jefferson game could have went either way and that proved to the girls that we can win the Region this year regardless of the probability of us going in the tournament as the No. 3 seed."

Chambers went 4-for-4 at the plate with 5 RBIs, two doubles, and a homer. Sophomore Maddie Garrett and Courtney Busbee each doubled and finished with a 2-for-3 day. King was 1-for-3 with an RBI

and Crystal Busbee was hit by a pitch twice, scored twice, and drove in one. She also picked up the win – striking out 10, while surrendering 7 hits and 2 earned runs.

Union County's scoring began when leadoff Crystal Busbee was hit on a 3-1 pitch in the first inning. Courtney Busbee reached on an infield single, and Chambers doubled to right – scoring Crystal and the courtesy runner.

Freshman Lydia Arrowood reached on an error to open the second, Garrett advanced her to third with a double, before Crystal Busbee brought her in on a sacrifice fly.

In the third, King was hit by a pitch and Courtney Busbee scored her on a double. Chambers followed suit with an RBI double of her own, giving Union a 5-0 lead after three.

Lumpkin got an unearned run in the top of the fifth but Union retaliated when Courtney Busbee walked and Chambers went yard, putting the Lady Panthers ahead 7-1.

An RBI single got the Lady Indians another run in the sixth but Crystal Busbee was hit by a pitch to open Union's half of the inning. Madison Rich

Garrett smacked a base hit, then Karley Nix singled in two. Langston brought in the fifth and sixth run on an error by the Washington-Wilkes first baseman.

Both offenses would remain silent until the fifth when Chambers led off with a base hit. Courtney Busbee followed with an RBI double. Karley Nix's two-run double ended the contest in the fifth at 9-0.

Union County 15 Washington-Wilkes 8

On three different occasions it appeared Union would run-rule Washington-Wilkes in the second game, but that wasn't the case.

The Lady Panthers held an 11-2 lead after two innings but we unable to score in the third or fourth innings to put it away. Union eventually made it 12-2 but the Lady Tigers put up six runs in the fifth to make it a game again at 12-8. However, three more Union runs in the sixth and Chambers returning to pitch the final two innings of the contest was enough to put Washington-Wilkes on ice.

With the Lady Tigers returning to Blairsville next week for the first round of the Region Tournament, Union was looking to make a statement, and the offense certainly did. The Lady Panthers will face Washington-Wilkes in a best 2-out-of-3 series beginning on Oct. 1st with Union's fifth consecutive State Playoff berth on the line.

"We were playing in honor of Rich and Stroman and the girls were fired up and came out hitting well," Coach Stewart said. "We needed that just in case we see them in the First Round of the Region Tournament."

Courtney Busbee, Kelsey Nix, Rich, Garrett, and Tanner each drove in two runs. While Karley Nix, Chambers, and King added an RBI a piece.

Crystal Busbee (7-5) got the win, working 5 innings, allowing 8 hits, 4 earned out, and striking out five.

Chambers gave up one hit in 2 innings, striking out five in the save.

Union County traveled to Lumpkin County on Monday before rounding out Region play on Tuesday at Rabun.

The regular season concludes on Wednesday when the Lady Panthers visit North Murray for a makeup game.

The second round begins on Oct. 8th with the "if necessary" game being held on Oct. 9th.

The Region Championship and consolation games will be on Saturday Oct. 12th - hosted by the higher seeded team.

The State Tournament will begin the following week with Region 8 facing Region 6 in the first round.
