City, County sign deal on new Energy tax

Hot topics at the Blairsville City Council meeting included a water main break on Jan. 4th near Cobb Vantress Inc. resulted in a Boil Water Advisory by the City of Blairsville; the expansion of the Blairsville Municipal Airport, and adoption of the county's Energy Excise Tax.

One of the items that impacted city and county residents concluded with the Council agreeing unanimously to an intergovernmental accord with Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris to adopt an Energy Excise Tax ordinance.

The county adopted the tax ordinance at its December meeting. While the explanation of the

ordinance is fairly complicated, basically, the excise tax replaces revenue that would be lost by the county and city from a sales tax exemption the state has placed on energy utilized for manufacturing, Paris said.

It is not an additional tax, but simply replaces lost sales tax through energy consumption. Under the ordinance

the county adopted, if the city wanted to receive their portion of the revenue, they had to approve an intergovernmental agreement, Paris said.

"I made the presentation to Mayor Jim Conley and the City Council," he said. "By signing the agreement, the city will receive the same amount of revenue collected by the county

as they would from SPLOST and LOST revenues."

According to Paris, who addressed the City Council prior to the Council's intergovernmental accord with the county, Georgia House Bill 36 passed by during the last session of the Georgia General Assembly allows an exemption for industry from the sales tax paid on energy used in the process of manufacturing.

"In our area, it is a relatively small amount, but in counties that have lots of large manufacturing plants and carpet mills, the lost revenue by the counties and cities could be dramatic," Paris said.

The new law allows any county to protect their own sales tax losses from the exemption.

The sales tax exemp-

Democrats honor J.W. Payne

If you know J.W. Payne real well, you know he's a dye-in-the-wool Democrat.

If you don't know J.W. real well, you'll know soon enough, he's a Democrat.

On Thursday night last week at the Union County Senior Center, more than 40 friends and fellow Democrats came out to toast J.W. for his 44 years in office as Union County Tax Commissioner.

J.W. didn't seek reelection last May during qualifying for local offices. It's the first time he hasn't qualified for public office in 56 years.

J.W. spent 12 years on the Union County Board of Education prior to running for Tax Commissioner in 1968. And yes, he also was a Democrat then.

Back in the day, it was rare for a member of the Republican party to win an election in Union County. Many tried, few succeeded.

That wasn't the case for J.W. because he never lost a race in seeking 14 terms of office, three on the Board of Education and having served as an 11-time elected tax commis-

sioner. "I was never beat in an election, and I thank y'all for that," J.W. told the crowd. "Running an election is a little different for me than it is for a lot of people. If I wanted a person to vote for me, I always tried to do my best to ask them, whether they were Republican, Democrat or of another party affiliation."

"I just came out and asked them," J.W. said. "And you better believe, I'll never be guilty of campaigning in church."

Union County Democratic Party Chair Nelson Thomas presented J.W. with a plaque honoring his years of service to the Democratic Party and his years of service to Union County.

Sheriff unveils department's administration

Newly elected Union County Sheriff Mack Mason has selected his administration team for the Union County Sheriff's Office.

Mason, a Blairsville Republican, defeated Incumbent Democratic Sheriff Scott Stephens in the November General Election, to become the first Republican sheriff in Union County in 64 years.

Mason's administration will be led by John George, a retired Chief of Police from Davie, Fla.

George will oversee the department's administrative and operational functions,

Sheriff Mason said. George is a resident of Union County, where he currently lives with his wife of 20 years. He began his law enforcement career in 1977 with the Davie, Florida Police De-

partment, where he served for more than 30 years in a number of law enforcement capacities.

In the latter part of his law enforcement career, George was named chief of police of his department, and was over more than 250 employees while serving a community of more than 90,000 residents.

George served as chief for just under nine years.

The administration under Sheriff Mason also includes Craig Davenport in Courts and Warrants, Tim Derflinger in property crimes investigations, Melanie Harris overseeing GCIC operations, Darren Jones overseeing the School Resource Officers, Mike Ler-

The hospital recently purchased a new EKG machine for the Suches (Station 5) Rescue Truck, capable of transmitting EKG readings

According to Director Wesley Rogers, a half hour is

vital to saving heart muscle, and the more heart muscle saved, the better the outcome.
