Army on July 20th, 1967. Following basic training, Ruud was trained as a helicopter mechanic.

Seven years later, Ruud became a maintenance inspector and Platoon Sergeant.

He concluded his military career as a First Sergeant, 12th Calvary Regiment, at Fort Polk, LA.

Ruud's stateside assignments included Fort Lewis, WA, Fort Eustis, VA, Fort Bragg, NC, Fort Riley, Kan., and Fort Polk, LA.

His tour came to an end on July 31st, 1987. All told, Ruud served his country for 20 years and 11 days.

During that tour, Ruud was awarded the Bronze Star, Army Commenda-

tion Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, Army Achievement Medal, Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Vietnam Service Medal with 3 Battle Stars, Humanitarian Service Medal, NCO Professional Development with 3 Device, Army Service Ribbon, Overseas Service Ribbon,

Vietnam Campaign Medal, and Senior Aircraft Crewman's Badge.

last three years we have been able to supply them with more than \$1,500 to support animals until they find their "forever" homes.

"We appreciate our partnership with the Mountain Shelter," Paris said.

The event puts an emphasis on recycling and document destruction, Paris said.

"At this event we will take televisions for a \$10 fee," he said. "This is what it costs to recycle televisions due to the high amount of mercury in the

glass. Document destruction also will be provided at this event."

Other items accepted free of charge include personal

computers, laptops, modems floppy/disk drives, printers, UPS batteries, CD-Roms, Fax machines, cell phones, circuit boards, copiers, phones, PC power supplies, stereos/VCR/CD-players, scanners, keyboards, typewriters, microwaves, mouse/mice test equipment, cabling, computer monitors, and networking equipment.

"To help us make your drive through quick and easy so you can enjoy your weekend, please remove all cabling

from your devices and place them in a bag," Paris said.

Items not accepted include console/projection televisions, car batteries, washer/dryers, toaster ovens, freezers, vacuum cleaners, dehumidifiers, blenders, humidifiers, gas-powered tools, household trash, refrigerators, tires, mixers, battery-powered tools, and ovens.

"We want to thank everyone who takes part in this special event," Paris said.
